Major road works in Stow on the Wold



If you are planning to drive through Stow on the Wold, allow extra time or find an alternative route between 17th and 26th September. This is because the A429 past Stow will be closed 24/7 while the road is resurfaced and a new sewer is installed under the road. Diversions will be signposted, including an HGV route which will take lorries from the B4077 onto Buckle Street, rejoining the A429 at Bourton on the Water. More quarry vehicles in Temple Guiting Parish?



TGPC has objected strongly to a planning application from Oathill Quarry which would legitimise the over extraction from the site which has gone undetected by Gloucestershire County Council for several years. The quarry proposes trebling the amount extracted, from the permitted 50,000 tonnes pa to 150,000 tonnes pa, which would more than treble the number of vehicle movements, from 2 to 7 per hour. The quarry believes this increase to be 'in the public interest'.

As an alternative to driving into Cheltenham, you could consider taking the bus, which runs on Tuesdays and gives you around 2 ½ hours in Cheltenham. Leaving Temple Guiting at 9.15 (Kineton 9.19), it arrives in Cheltenham at 10.38, after a change at Andoversford. The return bus leaves at 13.10 and returns to Kineton at 14.25, 14.29 at The Sherry.
